NURSERY RHYMES

Nursery rhymes offer oral support to children and aid in their development of hearing awareness. They are part of children's pre-literacy skills, being an important pillar in their cognitive development. Their value to children's language and learning foundation cannot be underestimated.

Learning nursery rhymes helps children develop phonemic awareness, memory and articulation, it helps children's understanding of concepts: painting pictures in children's heads, social routines, and Listening skills.

The activity it simple: Revisit your old favourite nursery rhymes, learn new ones! Use them to transition between activities or read nursery rhyme books at bedtime.

Early Years Learning Framework in Action

LEARNING THROUGH PLAY

Play provides opportunities for children to learn as they discover, create, improvise, and imagine. When children play with other children, they create social groups, test out ideas, challenge each other's thinking and build new understandings. Play provides a supportive environment where children can ask questions, solve problems, and engage in critical thinking. Play can expand children's thinking and enhance their desire to know and to learn. In these ways play can promote positive dispositions towards learning. Children's immersion in their play illustrates how play enables them to simply enjoy being. Early childhood educators take on many roles in play with children and use a range of strategies to support learning. They engage in sustained shared conversations with children to extend their thinking 5. They provide a balance between child led, child initiated, and educator supported learning. They create learning environments that encourage children to explore, solve problems, create, and construct. Educators interact with babies and children to build attachment. They use routines and play experiences to do this. They also recognise spontaneous teachable moments as they occur and use them to build on children's learning. Early childhood educators work with young children to promote and model positive ways to relate to others. They actively support the inclusion of all children in play, help children to recognise when play is unfair and offer constructive ways to build a caring, fair and inclusive learning community.

A message from our rooms



Ocean room – Turtles – In the ocean room this month we have focused on our social skills and us educators have provided activities and created play spaces to best encourage and foster positive relationships.



Our therist for this month is Vygotsky who believes that group activities and learning encourages social interaction, and this means for the children to be able to communicate and have conversation about learning. He also believes that children learn from being paired with more skilled peers or an adult.

Lots of activities where planned in groups the children have enjoyed doing

art as a whole class.

We look forward to December and Christmas as we are starting our Christmas art, craft, and gifts.



Ocean Room – Joeys –This month in the ocean joeys room we have been exploring around the ocean yard. We encourage children to help care for their environment and learning new skills, develop self-confidence by helping plant seeds, pull the weeds and watering the plants using the watering cans. We are also collecting dried leaves, sticks, twigs to create beautiful collages using natural resources. While the children are outside learning, playing and exploring, we have new

resources in our yard – Balancing stools – this can help develop better concentration needed for sitting and paying attention.



Time Flies Its nearly Christmas time and holidays are fast approaching. We read a story about Christmas and sung along to jingle bells using our musical instruments, the children enjoyed dancing and following the rhythm of the beat.

Just a reminder please pack extra clothes for water and messy play as the weather is getting warmer now and we will water play more often.

This past month we have really explored the children's interest in water play Creating a safe, secure and comfortable outdoor learning space where the children feel free to make choices and decisions that influence events that occur in their world. We are excited to begin a new learning journey as December falls upon us, Our goal will be to use natural materials and recycled materials to help create decorations for

our room, Christmas tree etc as it is a part of our belief that also aligns with our centre philosophy - That we are

sustainable, encourage sustainability, an educate the children about sustainability. Educators in the bush room have also been working on The NQS - QA3 (*Fit for purpose - 3.1.1*) - Making sure the indoor and outdoor play spaces are set up for children, activities and games are set out purely based on the children's interests. We are excited that Christmas is just



around the corner, however it is also bringing our time together slowly to a glorious end as the Bush Koala's will be transitioning into the Rainforest Room to become a Ranger with Miss Lisa. Have A Jolly Merry Christmas Everyone!

Rainforest— As most of you would know I have had a very quick recovery with my healing, and I am back to running around with the lovely children learning and having fun. The children really enjoyed our making of lunches and packing lunch boxes. We have seen the children use perseverance to open packets, manage lids and zips and my personal favourite — not eating the entire contents of their lunch box in one sitting. The children have been role playing teachers and students making connections to the similarities to school and kindergarten growing confidence in their next steps in their education.

Enrolment forms have been sent home as your child becomes school age and needs to do another enrolment to access the Cove.


